### FINAL NIH PUBLIC ACCESS POLICY IMPLEMENTATION

Beginning May 2, 2005, NIH-funded investigators will be asked to submit voluntarily to PubMed Central (PMC) the author's final manuscript upon acceptance for publication, resulting from research supported in whole or in part, with direct costs from NIH. PMC is the NIH digital repository of full-text, peer-reviewed biomedical, behavioral and clinical research journals. It is a publicly accessible, permanent and searchable electronic archive available on the Internet at <http://www.pubmedcentral.nih.gov/>.

The author's final manuscript is defined as the final version accepted for journal publication and includes all modifications from the peer review process. At the time of voluntary submission to PMC, the authors will specify the timing of the posting of their final manuscript for public accessibility through PMC. Posting for public accessibility through PMC is strongly encouraged as soon as possible (and within twelve months of the publisher's official date of final publication). As the archive grows, NIH staff and the public will be more readily able to access an increasing number of NIH-supported research publications in a single source.

Through this archive of peer-reviewed, NIH-funded research publications, health care providers, educators, and scientists will be more readily able to exchange and search for research publications, and the public will have greater access to health-related publications.

### MORE NEWS FROM THE E-JOURNAL FRONT

Several months ago the library installed Serials Solutions, a product designed to easily and quickly add electronic titles to our A-Z list of e-journals. As a result, we have been able to add almost 800 titles since December. We have added PubMedCentral, BioMedCentral, relevant titles from the Directory of Open Access Journals (<http://www.doaj.org>), Springer-Verlag, and titles with a one-year embargo. As more society publishers have opened up their archives to the public as freely available titles, we have added them to our list. In order to determine if our library has access to

a particular article, you will need to look carefully at the holdings note under the title. If you are asked to provide a login and password, then it is probably one of the titles for which we do not have access to the current year. This is because we do not have a subscription, but we do have access to the older material. The material that you cannot access can be requested through interlibrary loan.

Although the system cannot understand abbreviations, the wild card symbol (\*) can be used to easily search for articles on a particular topic. Use part of a word and the asterisk, i.e., *ped\** to retrieve *pediatria*, *pediatric*, *pediatrics* and *pediatrie*. The default search request is "Title Contains all Words." This is similar to a keyword search.

Browsing the alphabet will take more clicks. For example, there are 647 titles that begin with the letter *J*. The system breaks it down into more manageable pages. There are eight pages of *J*'s. Typing some of the journal's title in the search box will retrieve fewer entries and result in less clicking.

Along with this new A-Z list, we are in the process of adding many Springer-Verlag titles to the list. Last year, the owners of Springer acquired Kluwer Academic Publishers, and as a result they agreed to the terms of the consortial arrangement that we have with Kluwer for 2005. The combined Kluwer and Springer titles listed amount to almost 850 titles from a total of 1,297. Please take advantage of these offerings. We do not know what will happen in 2006.

While we continue to add titles to this list, we are aware that you may not find your favorite journal. We are accepting requests for our wish list, but at the present time we cannot afford significant financial outlays.
